The new year arrives with new problems and questions for us. In the beginning of every year, the parents of 5-6-yearold kids have to make a very important decision – what is the next step for my child? Where should he/she continue his/her education?

There are two common things we hear every year from the parents. <u>The first one is a question</u> "Will my child be prepared for public kindergarten or elementary?"

It is very important to understand that if we would prepare our students for traditional kindergarten, then we would not be Montessori, but the same conventional school where kids of the same age (but still developmentally very different) learn the same material at the same time based on the teacher's plan.

Our school prepares our students not for public kindergarten or elementary level, but for real life, which more and more requires great thinking and organization skills, independence, initiative, creativity, ability to work as a team, and so on. We provide a child centered, multiage environment, where kids are learning at their own pace through a hands-on experience, exploring, discovering, making connections, and developing all necessary life skills.

Therefore, the Kindergarten Year is the final and very crucial year in the primary 3-year cycle of the Montessori environment.

<u>The second thing</u> that we hear every year from many parents is that "being in a Montessori environment during one or few years was enough for our child's development. It is time for him/her to move to a public school like most of his/her friends. He /She will be fine there."

There is no "enough" in education and no bounds in a child's development. And being "just fine"- is this what we are looking for for our kids?

So, if you are still open to exploring all of the options and possibilities for your child's education, you are more than welcome to attend the Parent Night on January 22.

December was more peaceful than expected. Students were focused and readily chose work. We saw growth in reading, writing and self-discipline. All students became more aware of their role in the class as stewards of our environment and care givers to each other.

Food. The kids were divided into groups: sweet, savory, veggie foods to bring. They had to choose what item they would bring to share with their friends at the party. I always enjoy listening to the discussions that occur during the time togethercompromise, reasoning and kindness. For the first time in over 20 years of teaching, it was decided that sardines would be a part of the menu. Excellent!



Secret Santa. Students wrote their names on a piece of paper and then put them folded up in a basket. Each child then drew a name and showed it to me so I could record it. The students were then tasked with buying a gift (under 15 dollars) to give to their "Secret Santa". They were overjoyed by this challenge. We discussed the art of gift giving and receiving with strategies. I was very impressed with the gratitude kids showed to each other upon opening gifts. I loved the expressions and excitement of the students regardless of how was opening the gifts.

Our Christmas tree. Thanks to Ms. Alena for deciding that our room should have a Christmas tree. The kids assembled it, put the lights on it and decorated it all by themselves with only a little direction from me. It took several tries to get the branches right and the lights strung correctly but it was all their work. Finally, a tradition we will keep is the sharing of a favorite ornament. Next, I introduced the kids to Dot-Painting on a wooden ornament...another activity that they want to revisit! They were very mindful of the detailed work & step-by-step process that was required to achieve the desired result. And, I think they enjoyed painting with the wrong end of the paintbrush for a change...LOL. They did a great job with these! I know they'll be proud to hang them on your tree this Holiday.

We finished off the month with a really special treat, that I know your kids have been requesting & looking forward to...my daughter, Abby (age 17), taught her first Dragon -Drawing Class, using an overhead projector to illustrate step-by-step instructions for drawing a dragon head, as well as adding several details such as spikes, fur, jewelry, fangs, & scales. The students gathered around on the carpet, clipboards & sketch papers ready to capture every detail. 

The salt dough was measured, mixed, kneaded and rolled out by the children to create the salt ornaments. They also, cut out, baked, painted and wrapped each little gift by hand. Some even made wrapping paper by hand stamping and coloring the wrap. I hope you enjoyed your gifts.

Other holiday related activities were set out in Practical Life, matching ornaments to the outline, spooning holiday gems, tweezing and stamping.

Math held more of the same snowflake counting and number writing.



Baking was introduced to Practical Life this month. Baking is a multi-step, lengthy, activity. Baking is a real, not make believe. It satisfies all domains of developmental needs, cognitive, social, emotional and physical. The purpose of baking encourages natural development through purposeful motives of activity. Developing concentration, fine and gross motor control and fosters independence within the child. This very important activity provides the child the opportunity to fulfill the need for movement and independence, engaging mind and body, strengthening natural physiological development for mind and body integration.



The entire activity takes nearly an hour to complete. The child begins by washing hands at the hand washing stand, cleans that and sets out to knead, roll out the dough, transfer it to the tray, decorate it and bake it. The dough is then baked and clean up begins, washing, drying and returning all parts to the shelf. The label for the bag is made and the cooled dough is transferred to the bag to be sent home. Our baking mix is Bisquick and water. When you see these "cookies" come home, be proud of how much growth your child has gained Language and Science held parts of the reindeer and gingerbread man. We read the story of the "Baby Gingerbread man" by Jan Brett and some children made their own books to go along.

Unfortunately, in Geography we discovered we cannot make a proper scale model of the Solar System as the Sun and Jupiter are too large to scale the smaller planets to. We will figure something out if the interest is still there after our winter break.

The children worked hard learning the songs and movements for the Holiday Show. I hope you continue to enjoy them throughout the season. It was a lot of hard work and they did well onstage. It was very exciting to learn about other holiday traditions and celebrations. Thank You to Ms. Cynara for all of her hard work.

December was a wonderful month. Our children loved learning about holidays around the world. Please spend some time with your child and talk with them about some of your own family's holiday traditions. Each week we spent time learning how other cultures celebrate the holidays. We learned about Hanukkah, Kwanzaa and Los Posada, to go along with our Holiday Celebration.

For Hanukah we read "Hanukkah Hop" by Erica Silverman and discussed a few Yiddish terms and meaning. Such as dreidel, which is a spinning top used in a Hanukkah game. Each side is engraved with a Hebrew letter, *Nun, Gimel, Hei and Shin.* The children loved this game a caught on very quickly. Here are the Yiddish words for the game, see how many they remember, *Nun* stands for nothing, *Hei* stands for half, *Gimel* stands for all and *Shin* means you have to put in. Each child was given a piece of chocolate gilt at the end of the day.

We lit and talked about the Menorah and discussed the miracle of the little bit of oil that kept burning for eight nights. The children really loved seeing the Menorah all lit up. They had a chance to make a Jews flag.



We also discussed Las Posada, how people have been celebrating Las Posadas since it was introduced to Mexico in 1587 and how friends and family gather to recreate the journey in search for lodging and at first was refused and then were welcomed.



We made fresh Guacamole, salsa and chips, they made the Mexican Flag and a poinsettia art project to celebrate Las Posada with the children.

Another activity this month was putting up a Christmas Tree and decorating it.



We also had parts of tree, made with felt. The children could build a tree piece by piece. First the roots, then the tree trunk and then the branches and the leaves. We also had Parts of a Christmas Tree book that they could make. It started with the trunk, then branches, needles, lights, ornaments, and garland. They also made a Christmas Tree by rolling a car in paint and then rolling it on the tree to look like garland. Another Tree activity was building a tree from trunk up and then adding beautiful sequence to it, this was a big hit.





Parts of a Reindeer and Parts of a Gingerbread Man were also added to our shelves this month. We hope you have enjoyed seeing some of these projects coming home.



In our language area we had Christmas objects were younger children worked on beginning sounds and the older children built the words out. We had a Stereognostic bag filled with holiday object where the children have the ability to perceive and recognize the form of an object in the absence of visual and auditory information, by using tactile information to provide cues from texture, size, spatial properties, and temperature, etc. naming holiday objects.

ART:

- * Santa Puzzle --- color, cut apart and glue the four pieces in the correct position on another piece of paper.
- * Paper plate wreath --- paint plate green, when dry add green tissue paper, punch out red berries using a paper punch and add them to the wreath, trace hand on a folded piece of paper to cut out two hands at once to make the bow for the wreath, punch a hole in the top of the plate and add a string to hang.
- * Dancing reindeer--- color, cut out pieces and put together with brads.
- * Santa face using a paper plate.
- * Reindeer head---- used a ruler to trace a triangle on a brown rectangle shaped paper, cut out the triangle, folded two corners over to make ears, traced hand on a folded piece of paper to make antlers, added a red pompom for the nose and two wiggly eyes.



- * Candy Cane---- glued red tissue paper on each side of a paper cut out of a candy cane.
- * Colored and cut out holiday paper shapes, then glued them into a tree shape on another paper and added a star and a trunk to the tree.
- * Painted our gingerbread cut outs and added a string so they could hand on a tree.
- Advent calendar --made by using a tree and paper chains. We would take off a chain off each day as we got closer to Christmas.
- * Painted a picture using a holiday bow.
- * Mitten picture frame--- punch out pieces and put together.

SCIENCE:

#1 We covered the bottom of a bowl with baking soda, then added real candy canes on top of the baking soda. We mixed different food colors into four different cups of vinegar. The next step was taking a teaspoon to the colored vinegar and dripping it slowly on the candy canes. The baking soda and vinegar bubbled when the vinegar landed on the baking soda. We then poured all of the leftover vinegar on top of the candy canes. When we looked at our experiment the next day, we were surprised that all the candy canes had dissolved



#2 After talking about the story "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" by Dr. Seuss, we drew a heart on a balloon, put some baking soda into the balloon, added vinegar to an empty water bottle and then put the open balloon end over the bottle and let the baking soda spill into the vinegar which made lots of bubbles that began to make the balloon fill up showing how the Grinch's heart began to fill up with joy..

GAMES: "Hide the Santa". One student would hide the Santa object. Then the person who hid Santa would give clues to the one looking for it by saying warm, cold, warmer, colder, freezing to get them to know if they were near Santa. Like the old game of Hot and Cold.
