Montessori for the Elementary Years

If children near the end of their kindergarten year in Montessori, many parents struggle with the question whether or not to keep their children in Montessori for Elementary Program.

On the one hand the typical Montessori five-year-old's self-confidence and love of learning lead many families to ask: Why tamper with something that is clearly working?

Other parents feel that, since their kindergarten graduate will be moving on to another class one way or another, next year might be the logical time to make the transition from Montessori.

...If you are facing this choice, I encourage you to take a good look at your school's elementary program. Although, you will, of course, want to gain an impression of the teacher, focus your attention on the students themselves. Elementary students are often the best spokespeople for the value of a Montessori education.

What makes Montessori special is its ability to nurture talent without needless competition and stress. In a nutshell, Montessori children never lose the joy of learning.

Montessori education identifies children's strength and helps them hone those skills in a way that is unique to them. And while we, Montessori educators, promote independence and allow students to learn at their own pace, we also understand the importance of teaching children cooperative learning and teamwork at an early age.

Group and team building activities in the classroom can nurture social and emotional skills; language and literacy skills; fine motor skills; cognitive skills; and creative expressions through music skills. A child's interaction with others at school can also help build social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision making.

Unlike typical classrooms, Montessori schools combine students of different ages and allow them to interact and build off each other's development while also finding their own path to success. Building relationships with children of various ages as opposed to being around only one grade level all of the time will diversify a child's social skills and teach them how younger children look up to older children and how older children are supposed to be a good example for younger children.

Ms. Bridget and I had the great opportunity to observe our elementary and kindergarten students' teamwork and cooperation skills at the "Pulley's" Workshop in Legoland Discovery Center. The kids were divided by groups and tasked with building a Simple Pulley Machine. At the very beginning, with the excitement of having this opportunity, everyone started to build by him/herself, forcing their own opinion. In a few minutes, our students noticed that working alone was not a good idea. As soon as the students changed their work dynamic and became open to the ideas of others and trusting each other's knowledge and skills, the project was successfully completed in minutes.

The earlier we allow our children to socialize and realize the importance of teamwork and cooperative learning, the more prepared they will be to work in group settings throughout the course of their life.

COMING SCHOOL'S EVENTS



in February



Registration for the upcoming 2020-2021 School Year has begun!

It is that time of the year when we begin assembling the classes for the next year. We also begin to plan our staff and curriculum for the upcoming school year. On the first week of February you will receive a Re-Enrollment Paket.

If you have decided to continue your child's education at Montessori Pathways, once you have received the reenrollment paperwork, please

- a. Complete the Re-Enrollment Form for the 2020- 2021 School Year
- b. Attach the School Year Re-Enrollment Fee (\$50; \$25 for the second child)
- c. Return the Re-Enrollment Form along with Re-Enrollment Fee to school by March 1st.
- d. Submit 10% of the annual tuition security deposit no later than April 15, 2020.

By submitting your 10% of the annual tuition deposit on time, you secure your child's spot at our school for the next school year, can lock in your child's current classroom, and any other special schedules and arrangements made with the school.

All families enrolling and submitting 10% of the tuition <u>after April 15th</u> will be considered "newly enrolled" families, and will be subject to a new enrollment fee of \$100.00 for 2020-2021 School Year.

Spots are already limited and cannot be guaranteed - "newly enrolled" families will be enrolled on a first come, first serve basis. Classroom and any other preferences will also be up to administrative discretion based on availability.

Please do not wait until the last minute and help us and your family be successfully prepared for 2020-2021 School Year on time.

We are looking forward to having a lot of fun at our coming 4-day trip to Nature's Classroom Institute in Lake Geneva, Wi in the beginning of February.




























NEWS FROM THE ART CLASS (KINDERGARTEN AND ELEMENTARY)

During this chilly month of January, I taught your children how to draw & paint a jolly little snowman peeking out of the corner of their watercolor paper canvas.

The unusual, close-up perspective of this drawing is a novel take on what you'd typically picture when asked to "draw a snowman." Students did a great job following the step-by-step process, painting with a limited palette of tempera paint colors.

The resulting paintings really make me smile!



In contrast, students indulged in many, many colors with their next project...an acrylic painting of fireworks over water, in celebration of New Year.



After painting the canvas black, students drew a horizon line in white pencil, and painted festive, colorful bursts in the sky, followed by reflective color streams in the water. Students practiced brush techniques and the application of pressure on paint strokes in order to achieve the trailing tails of the fireworks.





Primary colors of acrylic, plus white, were provided, allowing plenty of opportunity for mixing custom colors, which students really enjoyed. We finished off their pieces with glitter paint to give the fireworks a festive, sparkly glow.



Repetition comes in many forms daily routine being one.




When the environment is stable the child knows what to expect and feels at ease, creating an optimal learning environment. For some children the schedule is the major focus, learning how to choose a work on their own and feeling confident and secure enough to thoroughly complete the entire cycle on their own. This is the practice of the child developing self-discipline and concentration before mastery can be achieved. Abstract thinking and problem-solving skills bloom from the self-correcting materials. It is exciting to see where the children's various interests lie.

In Art and Practical life, little snowmen and snowflakes have appeared. Snowflake spooning, snowflake gluing and finger-print snowmen are flying off the shelves.

Math contained snowflake counting 1 - 10 with beautiful, but messy snowflake prints to represent the quantities.

In Science we incorporated the parts of a penguin and parts of a snowman. These variations in each area are familiar and yet each contain subtle differences, renewed interests and new vocabulary.

We have started our New Year with some exciting changes. We are happy to welcome two new friends, Lotta and Naya, to our program. We have added quite a few new works this month for the children, which they seem to be enjoying.

This month we have been discussing the Arctic Region, and how some animals are migration, hibernation and adaptation animals.



Over the past couple of weeks, we begin learning about penguins, were they live, what they eat, how they survive the extreme cold.





We have been reading books about penguins and learning fun facts about these beautiful animals as well as making a penguin art projects and some children have made parts of a penguin. We also made Polar Bears with a fork and paint, built a felt snowman and they could create their own snowman art projects as you may have seen.





Our month started with the celebration of Martin Luther King's, Jr. birthday. First I gave every other child a sticker and ask those who did not get one how they felt? (But I did give all students a sticker after our discussion) That led into the discussion about how it would feel to be segregated on bus, classroom or movie theater. We also made some artwork depicting friendship and unity and the children were able to make a friendship bracelet.

We conducted and experiment using a brown egg and a white egg, to show the children how even though they did not look the same on the outside, they were the same inside. I read a couple of books to the children about Martin Luther King, Jr and discussed with them his dream (world peace, justice for all and fairness with our violence). The children each had a turn to express what their dream was and most of the children really seem to understand what we were telling them.

I would like to share a cute story with you about Martin Luther King, Jr. The first day back at school I had a picture of him on the calendar to mark his birthday. One of our 5-year-olds went to the calendar and pointed to the picture and said, "Who is this"? I said, "He's name is Martin Luther King" and then she said, "Where is his crown"? I said, "He's not a king, it just is his last name". She then said, "He is not a king"? So, I ask her, "What is your last name?" She told me and then said, "Oh, it's his last name?" I just wanted to share this with you because these are the moments that melt our hearts. So sweet and innocent.

The last week of the month we were celebrating Chinese New Year with Chinese lanterns, fortune cookies, chopsticks, and some beautiful decorations around the room.

One of our favorite books this month was "Rabbit's Snow Dance" by James and Joseph Bruchac. If you get a chance to read this book to your children, please do so. It's a funny take on a traditional Native American fable about the importance of patience and listening to your friends. It's about a rabbit that has no patience and he would chant, "I want it, I want it right now!" which as we all know that is how our children can be at times. They all started laughing when I read this part because they could relate. It was a great book and kept everyone's interest.





NEWS FROM THE LATE AFTERNOON

We learned about what animals live in the Arctic (polar bear, walrus, arctic wolf, harp seal, beluga whale, moose, fur seal, narwhal, snowy owl, arctic fox, puffin, and the arctic hare). We set up an area on a large sheet of cotton batting to place some of these animals. Blue felt was added for the water.

We compared two different types of penguins. The Emperor Penguin and the Adelie Penguin. The Emperor Penguin is the largest and heaviest of the penguins 48 inches tall and they have lighter yellow ear patches that aren't closed. They lay one egg and nest on ice. The Adelie Penguin is smaller, 30 inches tall with thin, white rings around their eyes. They lay two eggs and nest on rocky beaches. They both are birds, can swim and like the cold. We made a 48-inch Emperor Penguin and found out that he is taller than some of our friends.



We talked a little about Martin Luther King, who was a man who wanted peace for all.

After ready "Snowmen at Night" the children were asked what they would do if they were a snowman at night. Some kids would sip cold cocoa, some of them would go sledding, and some of the friends would simply go home.

GAMES:


- Match up Snowflakes
- * Pillow scoot race: children either sat on top of a pillowcase or put their feel and legs inside of a pillowcase and scooted to the finish line. One child would call out " On

your mark, get set, GO" before each race.

- * Four Corners: Colors where placed on four chairs that were set up in a large square. The children were standing in the middle of the square. Different movements were called out to do as they went to the color that was called. Tiptoe to the red chair when all had made it to the red chair we would go back to the center and call out another movement and color etc.
- * Cups and Pompoms: version 1 put a medium plastic cup on the line and stand back from your cup then toss the pompoms into their cup. Version 2 take one pompom in one hand and the cup in the other hand then toss the pompom straight up and try to catch it in the cup. Version 3 they called it popcorn where pompoms were placed in their cup and on the word "GO" they threw the pompoms up into to the air where they quickly picked them up and threw them up again.
